Party affiliation based on vote on proposed district system for selecting presidential electors in the election of 1800. A vote for the measure would have ensured the Federalists at least a portion of the electoral votes. A vote against the measure would have guaranteed that all of the electoral votes would go to the Democratic-Republicans. Since the State Senate was still Federalist dominated, no election law was passed and the legislature cast the vote, with Jefferson receiving one more electoral vote than Adams..
