\*\* John Kean vacated his seat between sessions by accepting an appointment from the Governor. He was replaced by Christian Ley.

\*\*\* Newspaper accounts reported a total of 16 Constitutionlists and 9 Conventionalist. However, these early accounts showed James Gamble, a Constitutionlist, as having been elected. In fact, the seat finally went to John Dorsey, a Conventionalist. The actual count was 15 Constitutionlists and 10 Conventionalists.

With the near disappearance of the Federalists as a political force, the Republicans split over the issue of Constitutional revision for the state. The traditional party names were replaced in the press by the titles of Constitutionlists and Conventionalists. The Constitutional Republicans were given the name of "Quids" by the Philadelphia *Aurora* and were allied with the remaining Federalists in opposition to constitutional change. The pro-convention Republicans continued to use that name and were referred to by their opponents as "Revolutionists."
