* James Brady was listed as a Democrat or a Quid prior to 1813 when newspapers began listing him as a Federalist. By 1815, his political transformation appears to have been generally accepted by Pennsylvania newspapers. It is uncertain exactly when this change took place. However, it is reflected in his independence as a voter and the Federalist support given him as a Senatorial candidate in December 1812 and his support of Samuel Sitgreaves, the Federalist candidate for the Senate in December 1814.
